Construction work on the Kota-Bundi Airport to get completed by Oct 2027-Speaker Om Birla

Kota. Lok Sabha Speaker Om Birla held a high-level review meeting at his office within the Parliament House complex to assess the progress of the Kota-Bundi Greenfield Airport project. Senior officials from the Airports Authority of India (AAI) were present at the meeting, while officials from various departments including the Divisional Commissioner of Kota, the District Collector of Bundi, the Kota Development Authority, Power Grid, PHED, and the Forest Department joined via video conferencing.

During the meeting, officials apprised the Lok Sabha Speaker of the project's progress, stating that the construction work for the Kota-Bundi Greenfield Airport is proceeding rapidly and strictly in



accordance with the stipulated timeline. The construction of the airport is scheduled to be completed by October 2027, and regular commercial flight operations are expected to commence from the facility by December 2027. Officials further informed that this Greenfield Airport, being developed across an area of 1,088 acres, will be equipped with state-of-the-art modern amenities. The airport's

runway will span 3.2 kilometers in length, enabling even the world's largest aircraft to land there with ease.

During the meeting, Lok Sabha Speaker Om Birla directed the Airports Authority officials to ensure that all necessary immigration-related arrangements are established directly at the Kota Airport itself. This measure aims to spare international travelers the need to undergo immigration

formalities in other cities such as Delhi, Mumbai, or Jaipur thereby ensuring that international travel facilities are conveniently and seamlessly available to them right from Kota. Additionally, Mr. Birla requested that the feasibility of establishing a flying training school at the site of the existing airport be explored.

The Lok Sabha Speaker also directed officials to explore the possibility of setting up an MRO (Maintenance, Repair, and Overhaul) facility in the vicinity of the new airport. Such a facility would foster the development of an industrial ecosystem within the region and generate employment opportunities for the youth. Gaurav Goyal, Joint Secretary of the Lok Sabha Secretariat, and Rajesh Goyal, OSD to the Lok Sabha Speaker, were also present

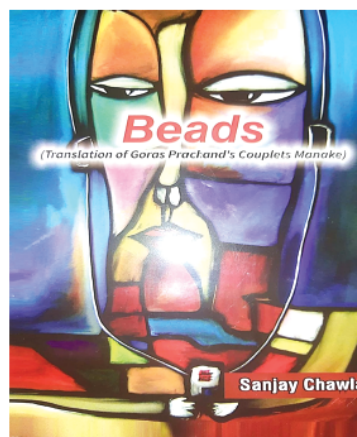
Beads : a unique work of translation

Shahbad / Baran. A historic grand rally organized by the Shahbad Forest Conservation Movement was held with the firm resolve to protect the forests of the Shahbad region. This massive gathering of people united to raise their collective voice in support of environmental conservation, the preservation of biodiversity, and the rights of the local populace. The rally witnessed unprecedented participation from the youth, farmers, tribal communities, social organizations, and environmental enthusiasts. Throughout the grand rally conducted through a procession of two-wheelers, a foot march, and a public assembly thousands of people peacefully conveyed a clear message: the forests of Shahbad will not be subjected to



any form of unscientific felling, mining, or destruction carried out in the name of development. Along the rally route, the atmosphere resonated with slogans such as "Save the Forests, Save Life" and "We Want Development, Not Destruction." Under the banner of the "Save the Forest in Mother's Name" movement, key conveners including Robin Singh (Green
